Catholic education has helped me to form roots in the truth, enabling me to rejoice in the life and opportunities I have been abundantly blessed with. In the words of St. Catherine of Sienna, "Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire." I take courage and strive to be compassionate in life's everyday moments like St. Therese of Lisieux, and find strength in St. Dominic Savio's initiative to live purely and in a self-giving nature.

In my Catholic school I have found role models not only in the saints, but also in the students, faculty, and religious who yearn to be God's beloved. Their examples have led me to desire knowledge, <u>veritas</u>, and connection with others.
